The Commission has adopted a new strategy to improve age-appropriate digital services and to ensure that every child is protected, empowered and respected online, with no one left behind.

# **3 PILLARS:**



A safe digital environment to protect children from harmful and illegal online content.

**Empower children in the digital world** and give them the necessary skills to make safe choices and express themselves online.





**Improve children's active participation,** with more child-led activities to foster innovative and creative digital experiences.

#### WHAT WE HAVE NOW



The **time children spend online** almost **doubled** between 2010 and 2020 in many countries. A majority of children use their smartphones 'daily' or 'almost all the time'.

**54%** of European children aged 9-16 using the internet visit social **networking sites daily** or even more often than that.

Globally, 1 in 3 children have reported being a **victim of online bullying**.

The number of online images of **suspected child sexual abuse** processed worldwide almost doubled between 2017 and 2019. The problem increased further during the COVID-19 pandemic.

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In Europe, **8%** of young people aged 15 are digitally unconfident.

### WHAT THE BIK+ WILL CHANGE

- encourage and facilitate a comprehensive EU code of conduct on age-appropriate design, covering topics including age assurance, data protection and clear and accessible information.
- support the development of an EU-wide digital proof of age.
  - ensure a '116 111' phone number for assistance on cyberbullying by 2023.
  - support reporting of illegal and harmful content through the Safer Internet helplines and hotlines.
- organise **media literacy campaigns for children**, teachers and parents.
- develop teaching modules for teachers via the <u>betterinternetforkids.eu</u> (BIK) portal.
- strengthen the support of Safer Internet Centres in Member States to children in vulnerable situations to address the digital divide.
  - involve children in the creation of the EU code of conduct on age-appropriate design.
  - support peer-to-peer training on online opportunities and risks.

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
